

Changing from summer to winter mode

We all love Montana's summers and, of course, the fall colors have been breathtaking, but now Old Man Winter is just around the corner.

There have been winters when I have been shoveling snow and found a hose or a sprinkler that I forgot to put away. What are things that we should all be doing to get ready for the colder days ahead? When preparing for winter, I like to start outside. First put away all the hoses and sprinklers. If you leave a hose hooked up to an outside faucet through the winter it may cause a pipe to split. This can lead to a leaking mess in your house and possible water damage. Cover up or store your patio furniture and that BBQ. Clean up the leaves, and not just on the ground. Now is a good time to clean out your gutters, outside vents and chimneys. You may want to cut back tree branches that could fall on the house or





even fall on a powerline due to winter's heavy snow. REMINDER: keep clear of powerlines, and if you aren't sure, give us a call!

You have put away your summer "stuff" and cleaned up the yard, the lawnmower has been winterized and

you have located your snow shovel and rock salt, so now what? Let's head inside the house to see what needs to be done. Make sure all your windows are shut tight and latched. If you had an A/C unit in your window, it may have bent the window frame a little. Make sure after you remove the A/C that the window shuts tightly and latches. This will help your house stay warmer and it is a good security measure. The furnace has probably not

run for a while and now is a good time to change out that filter and make sure nothing is piled around the furnace. If you have a ceiling fan it might be a good idea to reverse the fan to circulate warm air. Smoke detectors and fire alarms can be great life savers, when they are working properly! Check the batteries and give them a test. I know my dog goes crazy when I test the smoke alarms, but that is ok because I know he will help wake everyone up in case of an emergency. 324165

Sun River Electric will keep your power on, but sometimes mother nature can make that goal a challenge.

If you are without power, you need to be prepared, especially in the wintertime. It is a good idea to keep a few jugs of water handy and make sure you have flashlights that work and extra batteries close by. It is also a good idea to have a first aid kit. Try not to go in and out of your house too much if the power happens to go off during cold weather. This can let precious heat escape. The same principle goes for the fridge and freezer. Keep those doors closed as much as possible to make sure the food in the fridge stays fresh and the food in the freezer stays frozen.

It is a plus if you have a generator, but you need to make sure that your generator is ready to run. It is a good idea to check the oil, put in fresh gas and start your generator at least every three months. Check your extension cords for any frays and damage. Your extension cords should have three prongs and be rated for outside use. You may think you have enough extension cords, but remember that you may need a few new ones for plugging in the car, running the generator when necessary and of course you will need to get all your Christmas lights plugged in.

We haven't covered everything, but this is a good start to get you ready for the winter. The cold weather makes us stay inside more but that doesn't mean life should be cold and dreary. Pick out a warm blanket and a favorite book or choose a new hobby you have been considering. Stay warm and stay safe.
