## **New option for electric heat**

un River Electric Cooperative will be offering a new cost-saving rate to our first 20 members to sign up that use electric heat as the primary heating source. The heat source can be an electric furnace, electric baseboard, electric boiler, or ground/air-source heat systems.

The new rate will be 3 cents per kilowatts per hour less than the residential kWh rate. Depending on your heating type, the savings during the heating season (Oct. – Apr.) could range from 5 percent to 20 percent! Basin Electric Power Cooperative is the electric supplier behind this offering.

This offer to the first 20 members to sign-up is the second phase of the project. The alpha stage was completed this past heating season with four accounts. The initial exploration shows signs that this may be a good program to offer to additional members. The beta (second) phase is set to roll out this upcoming heating season. Positive results of the beta phase could lead to open enrollment for all electric heat member accounts.


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SREC encourages anyone who is heating with electric to consider this option. To be able to claim this rate option, the member will need to have the heat source metered separately from the other electric home usage. To help with that, SREC will provide the new meter base and meter. You or an electrician will need to install the meter base and perform whatever wiring is required for the installation. A wiring diagram is available from the cooperative. There WILL NOT be a second base meter charge for the second meter. Applications are available on the SREC website or by calling the office.

Test applications have been in place during the past heating season, and the results can be shared by calling Brad at 467-2526 and ask for the heat rate test results. 333431
