\$avings! New Option for Electric Heat

The Sun River Electric Board has approved the new electric heat rate program


Sun River Electric Cooperative (SREC) will be offering a new cost-saving rate for those who use electric heat as their primary heating source. The heat source can be an electric furnace, electric baseboard, electric boiler, or ground/air-source heat systems.

The new rate will be 3 cents per kilowatts per hour less than the resi-

dential kilowatt/hour rate. Depending on your heating type, the savings during the heating season (October – April) could range from 5 percent to 20 percent. Basin Electric Power Cooperative is the electric supplier behind this offering.

SREC will provide the meter and meter base, which must be mounted outside the house, there WILL NOT be a second base meter charge for the second meter. The member is responsible for all the wiring, and inspection of the wiring will be done when the meter is placed.
